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Meeting Manitou

Who loves cherries?

I know, I do!



Recently I had the pleasure of visiting and touring the home and farm of two of this areas rarest gems. Charlie Johnson and his lovely wife Marie Brumwell live and work on a farm about 7 km southeast of Watrous and Manitou Beach. Charlie says when he moved to the farm about 11 years ago, mostly all of the buildings were already there. He added to the place by building a garage and barn as well as planting a cherry orchard and large garden. The garden includes an abundance of sunflowers, squash, watermelon, potatoes, corn, pumpkin and dill. Over the years the orchard flourished and has resulted in locals being able to pick fresh, delicious "Carmen Jewel" cherries close to home. In fact, right now there are still lots of cherries to be picked.

Being in their 80's you would think that Charlie and Marie would be slowing down by now. However, this couple seem to be busy as bees. On top of working and maintaining a healthy orchard and farm, they raise chickens and geese and sell farm fresh eggs to some very lucky locals. This year they hosted a well attended cherry festival which was enjoyed by one and all.

Sometimes Charlie and Marie like to get off the farm so they regularly soak themselves in the healing waters of the Manitou Springs pool and also spend time volunteering and helping out in the community. If you haven't met this lovely couple yet, you definitely should.

Marie is a talented and gifted photographer and artist who has a lifetime of her works displayed in their home and also in the little, "stop and shop" shed located on their property. She lovingly talks about her kids and grandkids and you can tell they are always in her heart.

As for Charlie, he has a passion for his plants. He happily shows off his garden while gently placing a large leaf under each of his watermelons and pumpkins in order to avoid any damage. He is also proud that he doesn't use any pesticides on his plants and that the farm is powered almost entirely by solar panels. Charlie says he's hopeful that he and Marie will be able to have many more cherry festivals in the future. In fact, he spoke of possibly having a fall pumpkin festival this year. Of course, this is if they have a good pumpkin crop and if there is enough help.

I personally would love to help out with a fall festival with this fun couple.

In order for this to happen they will need some volunteers who are willing to donate their time and talents by sharing some baking. If this is something you would like to help out with, please call me at 306-291-9457.... and if you want cherries, there is still lots on the trees. At \$2 per pound, you can't get a better deal anywhere else.

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Campers



For Saskatchewan plated and licensed vacation trailers or cabin trailers.

Many people use their cabin/vacation trailers on their property while they are unlicensed. If the license has expired and you do have it on a package policy, then the trailer is essentially in storage and covered for physical damage, vandalism, water damage, fire. However, you must not use or operate it normally.

If you are using the unlicensed trailer for sleeping, cooking and eating and you have a loss/claim, that loss is not covered even if you have the trailer on a package policy.

There is one exception to this - the trailer has to be insured to its value on the package policy. This will incur a higher rate/premium that you will have to pay for the trailer on the package policy.

It is highly recommended that while the trailer is in use that it is licensed and it is covered on a package policy.

Cabin and tent trailers must be either licensed or insured to a value when they are used for cooking, sleeping or eating in order for coverage to apply. - Trailer must have wheels on and not be skirted in or on blocks.

It is important to notify your broker of it's cash value when it becomes unlicensed if you intend to use it in this manner.

Includes cabin, tent, dolly, utility and farm trailers, including stock and horse trailers.

Liability coverage extends to any owned or non-owned private trailer used with your insured vehicle and while in your care. Trailer must have wheels on and not be skirted in or on blocks. Liability extends to detached trailers which are "Licensed".

If a motorhome is unlicensed, coverage applies only if it is in storage (on a package policy) and is not used or operated for the entire time during the policy term.

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Blue Green Algae

What the heck is going on?? Blue green algae is actually a bacteria that has the ability for photosynthesis. It is endemic to most water bodies; fresh or salt. When conditions arise to promote its proliferation it grows exponentially. Usually this is heat related and later in the season. Unfortunately for us the conditions came in June and came in abundance. Most likely in the form of fertilizer or organics that washed into the lake June 13.

First detection is usually visual and Shawn W was one of the first to notice the telltale colour. Blue green can represent itself in other colours or expressions beyond the flashy blue green colour and it can even show no representation at all. Many people comment on what they see and even though those anecdotal observations can be helpful, visual observation is not a thorough analysis.

The office contacted public health on June 20th and testing was done on the lake on July 4th and 14th at which time public health posted the danger. The results were alarming. Higher than ever recorded in Saskatchewan. The toxin, microcystin, secreted by the bacteria, was at levels 600 times higher than safety.

Public health returned at the villages request on Aug 11th and we found on Aug 12 that concentrations of the toxin are still high. Unfortunately E. coli is now in very high numbers as well. It is noted at this point that many people are swimming in the lake. At least they are informed.

It has been a struggle to forego our cherished lake particularly on the very hot days but people have been patient, hoping for a turnaround. Summer of 2022: Flooding rains, a tornado and a toxic algae bloom, yet people continue to visit Manitou Beach and people are happy for an otherwise beautiful summer.



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Public Space

Thank you for remaining on your own property in these cases.



Heritage Trees



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


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Contributions

Working on a big, outdoor project definitely helps to meet new friends and neighbours at the Beach! You may have seen us out digging up rocks, weeding, watering, and transplanting various plants (we've had lots of comments too!) If you look closely now, you'll see some fine, green shoots of grass coming up around our place - including outside the fence. This fine green mist of growth is the beginnings of our Prairie Reclamation project and is the variety called Blue Grama. Working with

Naturalist Elizabeth Bekolay, we have spent time learning about the best, native plants for the rocky, clayey, slippery-when-wet soil that we have inherited. Starting with grasses to keep things from sliding all the way down the hill the next time it rains, we will be adding other varieties during the proper season for sowing. Including seeds, seedlings and transplants, we will hopefully have at least 25 varieties of native plants - grasses, flowers and shrubs - growing in our small piece of this amazing landscape. We'll be happy to give you a tour once things are more visible!

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
